

**2006-2007
SENIOR SCHOLARSHIP SURVEY
RESULTS**



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INTRODUCTION

The Senior Scholarship Survey was originally created to provide data to each school and to satisfy a reporting requirement for the DOE. The survey and the procedures for collecting the data were jointly developed by Senior High Guidance Department Heads and the Department of Assessment and Accountability. The scholarship survey results are used in the following ways:

- < The Guidance Resource Specialist (GRS) uses the information to target areas of improvement in the following year (i.e., academics, athletics, etc.).
- < Guidance departments use the information to increase efforts to reach ethnic groups who may be under-represented.
- < The examination of data based on gender is used for improvement in the following year.
- < The information is used to examine Bright Futures data. This information is based on scholarships that are offered and accepted.
- < The information is distributed to each school so they might look at possible areas of strength or weaknesses as well as a comparison between the district or other schools.
- < In addition to the reasons listed, the results may be useful for principals in communicating to the general public and parents, especially where related to school choice.

Through the Guidance Department at each senior high school, graduating seniors are asked to fill out a *Senior Scholarship Survey*. This survey asks students about scholarships they have been offered, whether or not the scholarship has been accepted, the duration of the scholarship, and the type of scholarship. The “type” of scholarship is defined as academic, athletic, performing arts, and other. For this report, student loans or Pell grants are not considered scholarships and are not included in the analysis. Scholarships offered by institutions such as military academies are classified as academic scholarships. The surveys are administered to seniors as close to the end of the school year as possible in order to capture as much of the scholarship information as possible. In addition, Guidance Counselors are asked to check the web page for their school to make sure all Bright Futures awards are reflected on the students’ forms. However, some scholarship offers are not received until after the academic year has ended. These scholarships would not be reflected in the analysis for the current academic year.

RESULTS

Note that all data that follow are based on information reported by students. Table 1 provides by-school information showing the scholarships offered and accepted, as well as the type of scholarship accepted. Graduating seniors in 2006-2007 were offered first-year scholarships that exceeded \$34 million and accepted first year scholarships valued at approximately \$22.2 million. The four-year value of the scholarships accepted was approximately \$84 million.

Data have been further disaggregated by gender and ethnicity. The data in Table 2 reveal that, as in the past, more females than males were offered scholarships. However, the amount of money offered to males was greater than the amount offered to females. The largest gender difference in type of scholarships was in Athletics where more males received scholarships than females.

Table 3 displays total scholarships offered and accepted, as well as the type of scholarship offered and accepted by each racial/ethnic group. The designation "other" was used for those students who did not indicate their racial/ethnic background or who checked this option.

Table 4 compares the types of first-year scholarships accepted for 2005-2006 and 2006-2007. Comparison shows that scholarships accepted by 2007 graduates increased by 1.2 million over the previous year. Academic scholarships increased approximately 1.3 million while athletic scholarships decreased by \$121,203. Scholarships in the areas of Performing Arts and "Other" decreased by a total of \$36,623.

Table 5 reflects that the average of the scholarships accepted by all students increased. The average scholarship for males increased while the average per year scholarship accepted by females decreased. The average scholarship amount for White, Hispanic and "Other" students increased, while scholarships accepted by Black and Asian students decreased.

Table 6 shows that over 3,600 students were offered a Bright Futures Scholarship (Florida Academic Scholars, Florida Medallion, Gold Seal) and 3,349 planned to accept these awards. This represents approximately \$9.49 million in total Bright Futures Scholarships accepted for the first year.
